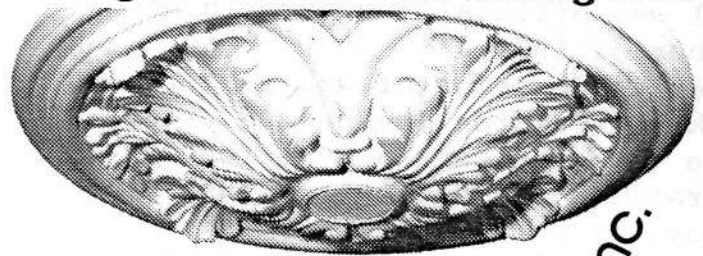
At ages 73 and 83 respectively, Nellie and Pop really enjoy the

I believe that every member can look at the accomplishments of SRG over the past year and be proud of the fact that they are a part of a vital and growing neighborhood organization. During the past year I have had the pleasure of meeting and talking with neighborhood leaders and public officials throughout the City and everyone has been impressed by the success of our activities. What astounds each individual about our success, is the fact that SRG is a volunteer organization and that all of our activities are coordinated and implemented by volunteer members and residents of Soulard. This, I believe is our greatest attribute as a neighborhood organization, as our organization represents a group of dedicated individuals who are committed to the revitalization of Soulard.

At this time, I would just like to point out a few of the highlights of the year:

The Housing Office at 1216 Russell was officially opened in December of 1980, thanks to the generous donation of the space by Dick and Delores Phelps, SRG was able to again have a base for operations and visitors. Vicki, Nancy, Ralph and Sandra Allen, Dick and Delores Phelps, others and myself helped decorate the office. Paul Kjorlie made the sign for the office. Thelma Hem-

men always manned her post faithfully throughout the year, answering the phone, providing information and graciously greeting

guests to Soulard. If possible, we should give Thelma the golden ear award for answering the seemingly endless calls prior to the Fall House Tour.

City House, 1981 - Representatives of SRG and Neighborhood Marketing Services (NMS) attended the City House 1981 program in Chicago in March. The booth at this fair represented a combination display of housing opportunities in the City and in Soulard.

The Soulard Friendship Quilt was completed in March of this year. The quilt which consisted of 36 squares, each representing a unique visual characteristic of Historic Soulard was completed by numerous members of SRG and residents of the neighborhood. The effort was coordinated by Sandra and Ralph Allen, Nancy Grimshaw and Vicki Renisch. The income generated by the sale of chances for the quilt served as a significant source of revenue to support our overwhelmingly successful 7th Annual Fall House Tour. Sandra, Nancy and Vicki promoted the quilt at various times throughout the City and many members sold chances. The quilt was raffled on the Sunday of the Fall Tour and the lucky winner was Pam Hoffman of St. Louis. Mrs. Lois Schoemehl picked the winning chance.

1981 Preservation Week Activities

The week of May 10 thru May 16th, 1981 was designated as National Preservation Week by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Neighborhood Marketing Services of St. Louis coordinated a Citywide celebration for Preservation Week and invited numerous neighborhood organizations to participate. SRG conducted in collaboration with Neighborhood Marketing Services (NMS) two major events including the Spring Walking Tour on May 10th and the first Soulard Saloon Safari on May 13th.

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The story of the Walking Tour was amazing as the expected spring weather turned out to provide 40 degree temperatures with never ending rain and wind. However, about 200 hearty souls took the tour and came into the housing office for warmth and refreshments. All in all the event was still a success. Both Ruth Uxa and Phyllis Young coordinated the Tour, Skip Gaterman, as always, provided the script and several wet tour guides provided the soggy narrative.

The Saloon Safari, which was an idea developed by NMS, was a fantastic success. About 500 individuals toured and imbibed on busses provided by participating bar owners and everyone had a great time as the commercial aspects of Soulard were displayed to our guests. Jim Marquis and Frank Dawson coordinated the event with Betsy Cook and Dayle Kline of NMS.

Our final event of the week was the provision of refreshments at Soulard Market Plaza to participants in the Rehab Bicycle Ramble coordinated by NMS. The "ramble" drew a huge crowd and SRG displayed the quilt, handed out cold 7-Up and gave balloons to children. Preservation Week was a great success thanks to the hard work of NMS and the participation of SRG and its membership. We all look forward to working with Betsey, Dayle and Betty of NMS next year.

The Windows on Soulard Project was aimed at improving the appearance of vacant buildings in Soulard and increasing their marketability for rehabilitation. The idea became reality due to the hard work of Terry Berger and LuAnn and Roger Rimel. Terry, this year's Proposal Committee Chairperson, prepared successful grant applications for funding by the Arts and Humanities

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Commission and the First National Bank of St. Louis. Roger coordinated production and LuAnn provided her artistic expertise and developed the decal design and silk screens. Numerous SRG members and Soulard residents participated in the silkscreening of the decals at the Berberich Garage. This space was generously donated by the St. Louis Post Dispatch for production. The fruits of their work can be seen most prominently on the south side of Lafayette Avenue just west of 9th Street and at several other locations in Soulard.

House of the Month - The metropolitan wide name recognition of Soulard was seen again as Leslie and I had the pleasure of having our home open for the August House of the Month. Sponsored by Neighborhood Marketing Services (NMS), over 1,000 persons came through our home in a three hour period. According to Dayle Kline of NMS, they represented the largest crowds ever.

The Fall House Tour as everyone by now knows was an outstanding success. The Tour Committee which included Sandra Allen, Vicki Renisch and Nancy Grimshaw, put together a grand weekend for tour guests including 18 houses on tour, the Pontiac Park Street Fair and numerous other events. Their publicity efforts were superb as approximately 8,000 individuals attended which is the largest crowd ever generated to a Soulard House Tour. Our thanks to everyone who worked over the tour weekend to make the tour such a success. Over 250 persons volunteered their time over the tour weekend.

Anheuser-Busch assisted our efforts by providing the printing for the poster and brochures which were both beautiful. They also hosted the dinner for tour workers on October 3rd. Our thanks to Anheuser-Busch and the numerous other busi-

nesses, agencies and individuals who supported the event and helped make it such a tremendous success.

In conjunction with the Fall House Tour, the VIP tour was held on Sunday, September 27th. The tour began with a brunch at Hilary Clements' home, then the VIP's proceeded to take the tour. Kathy Poe and Amy Dawson handled the VIP tour.

The Soulard Wall Mural which was designed and painted by On The Wall Productions was completed and dedicated on September 26th. The mural boasts the SRG theme "Soulard Where the Past Meets the Future." The mural was initiated in Paul Houghland's administration as On the Wall Productions approached SRG for our support. The design of the mural was approved by the SRG membership at the July, 1980 meeting. The mural was funded by CDA and Manufacturers' Bank. Many local officials were at the dedication including Aldermen Sam Louis and Martie Aboussie, 7th Ward Committeeman Sorkis Webbe, Jr. and Frank Hamscher, CDA Director.

The Newsletter became self supporting this year thanks to Paul Houghland's aggressive approach to obtaining advertisements. Also, the generous donation from the Anheuser-Busch Employees Credit Union (ABECU) which was obtained through the efforts of Paul helped considerably. The content of the Newsletter was excellent and Skip Gaterman, Editor, managed to get the paper out in a timely fashion regularly.



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The Membership Committee headed by Paul Houghland successfully recruited 26 new members through the various methods including the Membership Recruitment Campaign and a social for new property owners and residents of Souland which was held on September 9th. Amy Dawson and Vicki Renisch each won a free dinner at the Grizzly Bear by recruiting five and three new members respectively.

In addition to the above, other events made Souland stand out in the City. These included the Souland Mardis Gras celebration which was spearheaded by Board Member Hilary Clements who is the major contributor in Souland annually for parties and related social functions. The Code Committee also remained vigilant throughout the year with former Chairman Paul Kjorlie and Hilary Clements putting in numerous hours in their efforts aimed at preventing demolitions and assuring that construction work is consistent with the Historic Code Standards.

I enjoyed serving as President this year and I am proud of the accomplishments we have made thanks to all of the work done by our membership. However, each year we must make additional progress. We can only achieve such progress through an active and supportive membership. With everyone's help I believe we can look toward a very strong and positive future for both the SRG and the redevelopment of Souland.

## THE RESTORATION SHOPPER

With less than two months away from Christmas, it is a good time to begin planning your Christmas shopping to avoid the last minute dilemma. Many shops in Souland were visited to give you some gift ideas that can be purchased within blocks of your home. All of the listed shops are open on Saturdays.

If time is short and your list is long the best place to begin is in the Souland Market. Possible gifts could be a basket full of fruit or vegetables, a variety of spices from the "Spice Shop" for the person on your list that enjoys cooking. Ribboned tied bags full of pecans, walnuts, Brazilian, hazel or a nut mix would be greatly appreciated by someone who likes to bake. Jars of jam, homemade bread, hanging plants, and inexpensive stocking stuffers can also be purchased at one of the many stalls.

When you are finished loading your car of market purchases, cross the street to 822 Lafayette and visit the "Gallery of Soft People." In the gallery you will find unusual art objects ranging from \$15.00 Beardsley pillows to a full length "soft lady" for \$1500. These gifts might not be for everyone, but they are certainly fascinating to look at.

Next door is the "Once Upon a Time" shop that is primarily filled with glass and china collectibles. An ivy patterned McCoy teapot with creamer and sugar was marked \$35.00, and a variety of decorative glass items were under \$15.00. You can

leave through the rear door and enter into the "Market Place" where there are several shops

under one roof. Here you can find period furnishings for a doll house, antique glass and household items, and some furniture.

The next closest shop is the "Fire House Pottery" at 912 Allen. Pottery mugs can be purchased for around \$5.00, teapots for \$20.00, a set of cannisters for \$30.00 and decorated platters for use or wall decorations between \$20.00 and \$30.00. On November 21 and 22 (the Saturday and Sunday preceding Thanksgiving) there will be a special showing for Christmas.

From the fire house go to Twelfth and Russell Streets. The first shop is the "Sixth Day," and the proprietress is Delores Phelps. Delores stated that in the past some of her most popular Christmas items have been odds n ends dishes, wine glasses and butter knives. Many people who like to bake give their home-made items on a pretty decorative plate with an antique butter knife or give a bottle of wine with a couple of unusual wine glasses. She had several interesting tablecloths that can be purchased from \$6.00 to \$12.50. There were two signed Victorian side chairs that were marked \$95.00 a piece, and plenty of depression glass in pink, green and clear that would be a delightful gift for a collection.

In the "Housing Office," which is only a couple of houses away, you will find Soulard T-Shirts, cook books and bumper stickers. In the rear of the housing office is located "Mary Kay's Sewing Basket." If you enjoy making your own Christmas gifts you will be able to find a variety of items ranging from table scarfs to embroidery, embroidery thread, quilt batting, quilt material and needlework kits. Mary Kay Johnson has ready made pillows from \$15.00 to \$30.00. A gift certificate could be purchased for quilting or needlepoint

instructions. Mary Kay will also do certain types of custom work upon request.

From Mary Kay's you can walk to the corner of Russell and Gravois to "Todd Uniform Outlet Store" and find men's new navy quilted jackets for \$13.95 or navy and camel colored work slacks in sizes 32-46 for \$13.75. New "Fruit of the Loom" T-Shirts are \$1.50 and a set of insulated underwear is \$6.95. For the person on your list that has everything except old or used clothing you might want to purchase some used coveralls, shirts or slacks for only a couple of dollars.

If you have been wanting a custom stained glass transom or you would like to purchase a small window for a gift, "Mithra Glass Works, Inc." at 1304 Sidney is a good place to visit.

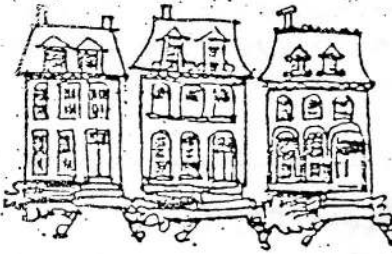
For new gift items that are reproductions of historic items visit "The Chatillon-DeMenil House Gift Shop" at 3352 DeMenil Place.

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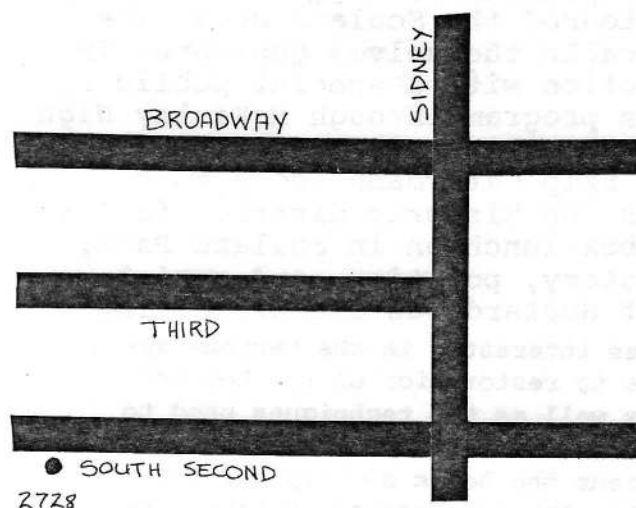
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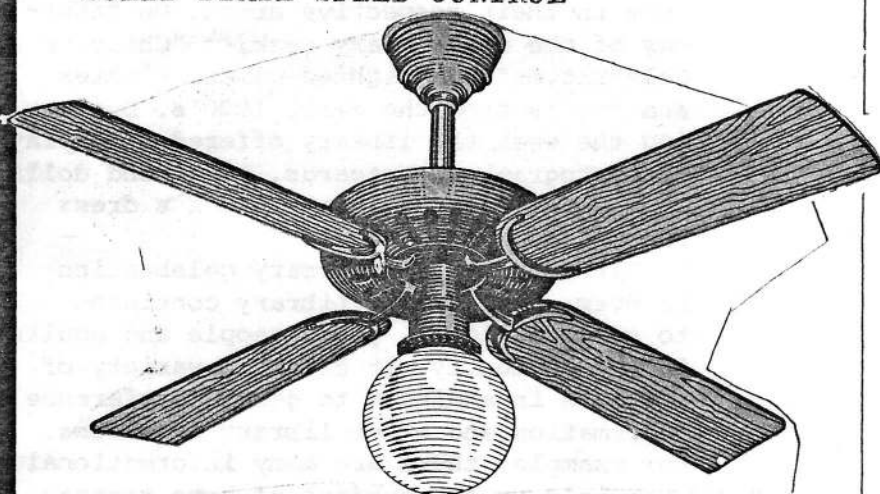
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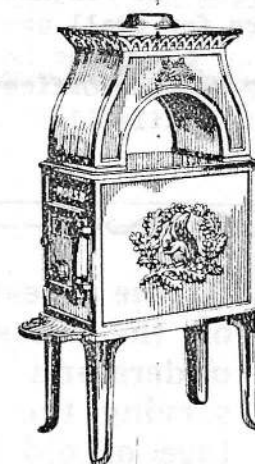


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## QUESTERS GROUP TOURS SOULARD

On September 30 a group of twenty women toured the Soulard area. The group calls themselves Questers. In conjunction with a special public relations program through McKinley High School and the Soulard Restoration Group, Skip Gatermann led a tour through the historic district following a box luncheon in Soulard Park. The history, politics, and social life of Soulard was discussed. The group was interested in the various approaches to restoration of the housing stock as well as the techniques used to retain the flavor of the area. As part of the tour the homes of Skip and Darlene Gatermann and Gary and Debbie Slemmens were viewed. Also, open that day was Sandcastles' offices at 12th and Ann. John Ward extended a personal invitation to the group to view the office while various staff members went about their daily activities. The women were amazed that Soulard was developed to such a high degree. They commented that the enthusiasm for restoration seemed to burst from the neighborhood.

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## DIAMOND JUBILEE FOR BARR BRANCH LIBRARY

A full program of activities, for people of all ages and interests, highlighted the 75th anniversary celebration of Barr Branch Library, 1701 S. Jefferson, during the week of September 14, 1981.

Dedicated September 17, 1906, the library at the corner of Jefferson and Lafayette was the first in St. Louis. Three years earlier (1903) William Barr, owner of the William Barr Dry Goods Company, gave to the board of directors of the St. Louis Public Library the tract of land upon which the building stands. Andrew Carnegie, a steel manufacturer in Pennsylvania, made a gift of one million dollars which was used to build Barr Library, the Main Public Library on Olive Street, and three others in the City of St. Louis (Cabanne, Carondelet, and Carpenter). The cost of construction for Barr was \$72,000.

During the anniversary week, on Monday, September 14, Gene Mackey of the architectural firm Eugene J. Mackey and Associates spoke about the work of Theodore Link, who designed Barr Branch Library and Union Station. On Tuesday, films were shown. On Wednesday evening an open house was held for neighbors and friends. On Thursday evening a Neighbor-

hood Restoration" Panel featured representatives from St. Francis De Sales Catholic Church, The Lafayette Square Restoration Committee, the Soulard Restoration Group, the Pantheon Corporation, and Neighborhood Marketing, who spoke about rehabilitation, housing, and related matters in their respective areas. On Saturday of the anniversary week, a "Children's Celebration" highlighted games, stories and crafts from the early 1900's. During the week the library offered a display of photographs, postcards, toys, and dolls from 75 years ago, also a woman's dress from that period.

Although the anniversary celebration is over, Barr Branch Library continues to serve children, young people and adults in the community. It offers a variety of services in addition to general reference information and other library functions. For example, there are many informational materials on the subject of home renovation, covering both interior and exterior design. There is a children's literature room containing all kinds of helps for students completing their homework assign-

ments. Older reference works are being replaced by newer volumes. For those who love to read mysteries there is a large collection of fiction. Beginning in October children's films will be offered every Wednesday afternoon. On the first Thursday of the month a representative from Congressman Richard Gephardt's office is at the library from 2:30 to 4:00 p.m. to handle other matters concerning the congressional district.

In the near future, the library will offer a special instructional program on home insulation. The program will be held on Wednesday, October 14, beginning at 7 p.m. There is no charge for this instruction, which is available to everyone. For further information call 771-7040.

#### LAFAYETTE SCHOOL OBSERVES 75th ANNIVERSARY

For 75 years Lafayette Elementary School, 815 Ann, has been providing a sound educational foundation for its students and serving the people of the community. On Sunday, October 18 students, graduates, administrators, and friends came together to celebrate the Diamond Anniversary of the school in a program during the afternoon.

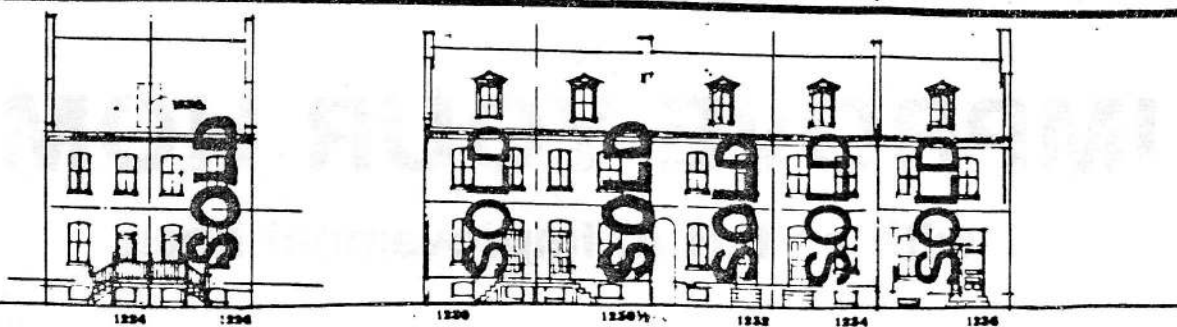
Located in the historic Soular area, the present school was dedicated in 1906. It replaced an older building called Lafayette School which was located at another site. Throughout its history it has held an important and unique place in the community.

The present building consists of 22 classrooms, a kindergarten room, the gym, a media center, the nurse's office, and rooms for breakfast and lunch. The school provides special services to those children whose needs are identified in the areas of remedial reading and remedial math, special education, speech, art and music.

"The primary concern of the Lafayette School staff," wrote Principal Robert K. Cloyd in a letter to parents, "is your child's education, welfare, and development. Proper learning is encouraged with firmness and fairness along with a willingness to listen to each student."

Members of the Lafayette Patrons and Mother's Club, together with the school staff, developed the anniversary program to tell the history of the school since it opened. Pictures, picnic programs, graduation group pictures, and other visual ways of looking back were on display for those who remembered the past. There was an opportunity to visit with former classmates and teachers as well as with present students and staff members. Just for fun, an imitation diamond ring was given as an attendance prize to the person who has the key to unlock the "treasure chest."

The program on October 18 was for all past and present friends of Lafayette School, including former and present students and staff members, graduates, parents, administrators, business people, and political leaders.



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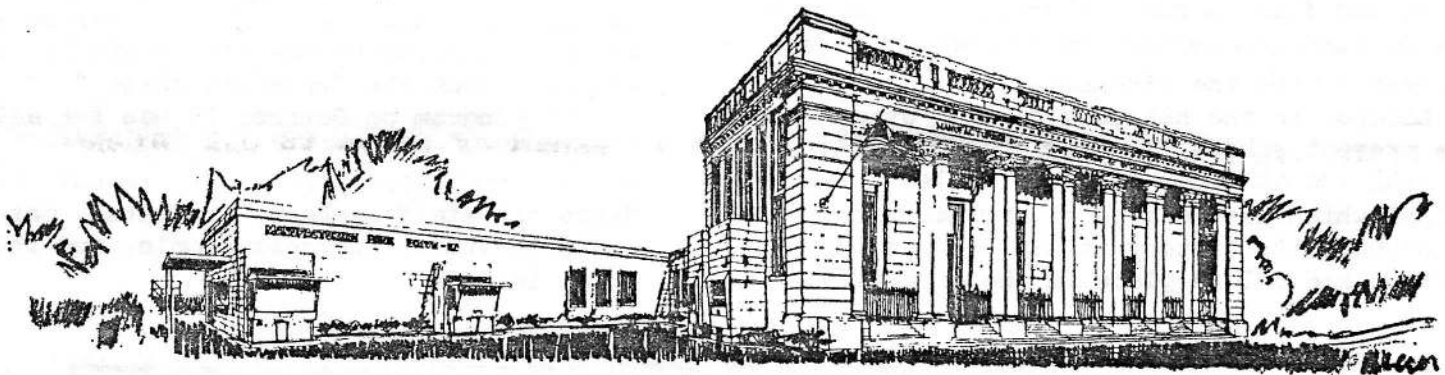


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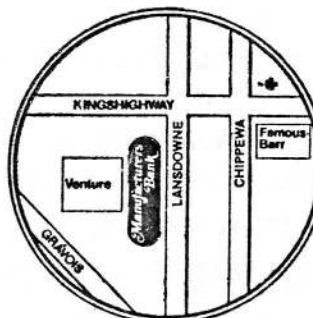


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### GREAT GRANDMOTHER'S REVENGE

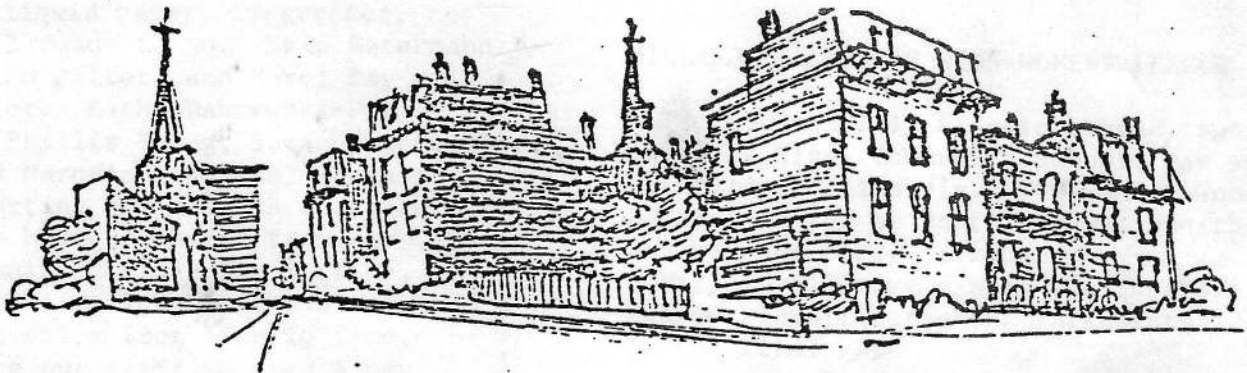
